Business Plan 2020-23



Introduction

This Business Plan outlines the agreed priorities for Hampshire Safeguarding Children Partnership (HSCP) for the period 2020-2023.

The HSCP is a statutory body established by Working Together to Safeguard Children 2018. The HSCP is led by three Safeguarding Partners including Hampshire County Council Children's Services, West Hampshire Clinical Commissioning Group on behalf of the Hampshire, Southampton and Isle of Wight CCG, and Hampshire Constabulary. The broader HSCP consists of Relevant Agencies that cooperate with each other to safeguard children and promote their welfare. We are responsible collectively as a Partnership for strategic oversight of child protection arrangements across the local authority area of Hampshire and our role is to lead, coordinate, develop, challenge and monitor the delivery of effective child protection and safeguarding practice by all agencies across Hampshire. Our Purpose

Section 3 of Working Together 2018 states that the purpose of local safeguarding children partnership arrangements is to support and enable local organisations and agencies to work together in a system where:

- children are safeguarded and their welfare promoted
- partner organisations and agencies collaborate, share and co-own the vision for how to achieve improved outcomes for vulnerable children
- organisations and agencies challenge appropriately and hold one another to account effectively
- there is early identification and analysis of new safeguarding issues and emerging threats
- learning is promoted and embedded in a way that local services for children and families can become more reflective and implement changes to practice
- information is shared effectively to facilitate more accurate and timely decision making for children and families

Our Vision

The vision for the Hampshire Safeguarding Partnership is that children and young people in Hampshire grow up in a safe environment, free from abuse and neglect. Children, young people and their families will receive the right level of support & intervention, at the right time, by skilled professionals to ensure that children and young people have the best start to life.



Our Values

- **Transparency** we will foster a culture of openness and transparency. HSCP partners are required to work openly together, to learn from collective and individual experience, and to seek and receive assurance on the overall effectiveness of work to safeguard and protect children in Hampshire.
- Honesty we will be honest and open with each other on areas of challenge, transformation and system change to inform decisions on future initiatives and collaborative working.
- **Challenge** we will respectfully and constructively challenge each other to drive continuous improvement and deliver the best outcomes for Hampshire children.
- **Collaboration** The three Safeguarding Partners and all Relevant Agencies will work proactively, effectively and collaboratively together. We will value differences to help drive improvements for children and young people.
- Listening to the voice and lived experience of the Child Everything we do will benefit children and young people in Hampshire. We will ensure that our work is child centred and we continually seek to engage and involve children and young people and their families.

Key Priorities

The HSCP Business Plan has been developed to focus on a set of agreed priorities that have been grouped into:

- a) Part A of the HSCP Business Plan contains long-term strategic objectives spanning the period 2020-2023. These objectives cover complex areas of children's safeguarding which require a deeper collective understanding to inform a targeted and coordinated partnership response to achieve real impact on the lives of children and young people living in Hampshire. These objectives have been identified from themes arising from the Partnership's existing scrutiny and quality assurance programmes, as well as findings from local and national learning reviews. The strategic objectives will remain the same for the three year period of the plan but the activities that sit underneath them will be reviewed and refreshed annually during that period.
- b) Part B of the HSCP Business Plan contains several shorter-term activities, typically covering a reporting year. These have also been identified from the Partnership's existing scrutiny and learning review programmes and support the HSCP's statutory functions. This part of the Business Plan will be refreshed annually with new activities identified when appropriate.

The structure of the business plan allows the Board to focus on key strategic areas of partnership activity but also remain flexible to respond to emerging needs and refine existing programmes of activity in line with feedback received from children, their families



and professionals. To support the delivery of the Business Plan more detailed work plans, aligned to the Board's priorities, will be developed for each Sub and Working Group.

HSCP will take a leadership role in the delivery and quality assurance of partnership work in these areas. Progress against this plan will be reviewed and monitored by each individual subgroup / Task and Finish Group in the first instance. Where necessary and appropriate, the Business Group will highlight both areas of concern and areas of good practice and success to the full HSCP Board meetings for further action.

Responding to Neglect

To be undertaken in partnership with the Isle of Wight Safeguarding Children Partnership (IOWSCP).

To enhance the understanding of neglect amongst professionals across Hampshire and give them the tools to better identify indicators of neglect, and, understand what interventions are available to support and protect children affected by and / or at risk of neglect.

Re-establish the joint HSCP and IOWSCP Neglect Task and Finish Group to;

- Respond to the outcomes of the 2019 HSCP evaluation of Neglect.
- Update the joint HSCP / IOWSCP Neglect Strategy.
- Review the joint online Neglect Toolkit to include additional information on neglect and consider other tools and practical information to support front line practice.
- Review current HSCP training offer on neglect.
- Provide material to support single agency training in HSCP Safeguarding Partners and Relevant Agencies.
- Consider gaps and other opportunities to promote best practice in multi-agency working to understand and respond to neglect.

Re-establish annually the joint HSCP and IOWSCP Neglect Task and Finish Group to;

- Continue to consider gaps and other opportunities to promote best practice in multi-agency working to understand and respond to neglect
- Evaluate and measure the impact of the Neglect Strategy, Toolkit and Training Offer.
- Review the toolkit to ensure links and resources are relevant and up to date.
- Delivery of HSCP and IOWSCP Neglect training which promotes the information and tools within the Neglect Strategy and associated Toolkit.
- HSCP and IOWSCP to continually consider gaps and other opportunities to promote best practice in multi-agency working to understand and respond to neglect.
